Teaching :

Doctors

- hands on teaching in the operating theatre of modern techniques of laparoscopic . surgery

Anaesthetic technician

Taught local staff the importance of looking after and checking of anaesthetic machines, ward 0 based patient monitors etc.

Transport

Being in close proximity to the hospital helped with this issue greatly. Labasa hospital was very helpful in this matter in providing transport in a timely manner.

There was also help available from our local friends.

Meals

Breakfast was provided by at the local hotel funded by FOFH. During week day, morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea were provided by the Labasa hospital.

Evening meals – Mr Kohli was able to delegate each evening to an organisation to cater for the meals. This was greatly appreciated by all the volunteers

Team debrief

Points discussed

A complete set of laparoscopic instruments (near new) were donated to the surgical team to help advance their laparoscopic skills.

Labasa Hospital is keen for us to have regular visits but we have mentioned that we will be reviewing our visits based on the time available and availability of the funding.

We acknowledged there support in terms of providing transport and lunches for the visiting team.

Sister in charge is keen to up skill all the theatre staff especially with laparoscopic surgery.

Points raised which could be actioned for the safety of patient

DVT prophylaxis – It is essential to have complete DVT prophylaxis which includes anticoagulants, TED stockings, Calf compressors and early mobilization. Given the limited resources in Labasa the things that could be done easily are

1 - Investing in a calf compressor device which could be used in theatre especially in long operations.

2. Early mobilization

Body warmers – This is a simple device which blows warm air over the patient to keep them warm while the surgery is performed. This greatly helps with patient recovery.

Patient notes – all to be filed together i.e. inpatient and outpatient notes so that there is easy access the patients past history. This will help prevent duplicating of things already done before. Entry in the notes to be done in a chronological manner.

Theatre Storage and space utilization - itemizing and clearing some of the things not used or expired to create space for things used currently. Making storage cupboards.

Infection control – regular hand washing between patients, soap or hand sanitisers easily available, wearing of single use gloves between patients, use of dry towels to wipe hands

Highlights

Achieved a mission to make a difference to a small number of patients who would not have had their operations done locally.

Kept the mission within budget.

Donated laparoscopic gear for advancement of patient care.

Teaching – both hands on and didactic

Disappointments

Could not do surgeries on all patients seen as we had time constraints and laparoscopic gear arriving late

Future missions

- We would like Fiji Government to provide ongoing assistance to our missions, such as transport, meals, accommodation etc) as it does take a lot of pressure off the organisers and the volunteers. This leaves more time to dedicate to teaching and doing the jobs we go there for.
- The teams should give enough time between each overseas missions so that local staff can cope with the added work load.

PEOPLE of Labasa and the North will benefit from surgical instruments worth \$250,000 given by members of the Kiwi group, Friends of Fiji Health to the Labasa Hospital Board.

a group of former Fiji residents who are health professionals provided medical clinics to about 80 patients in Labasa this week.

Accompanied by some of their colleagues in New Zealand, members of the Friends of Fiji Health organisation brought a sigh of relief and smiles to the patients with their medical clinics, advice and surgeries.

One of the organisation's trustees and general surgeon Dr Rishi Ram told this newspaper on Wednesday night they had visited Fiji for the past four years.

"Three of our earlier trips were made to the Lautoka Hospital and now we have decided to come to Labasa Hospital to provide our service here free of charge," Dr Ram said.

"The team is made up of doctors, nurses and other health experts who have a common goal of assisting local experts with their work. Since our arrival to the hospital last Thursday, we have continued to medically examine patients.

"We conducted surgeries on some of them (patients) but because of the time constraints and the lack of resources, we weren't able to operate on all of the patients who were recommended for surgery.

"We will leave behind the medical items and equipment we brought with us to supplement the supplies locally. This is part of our efforts to reach out to the people here and we are really glad to have provided our service to the people here.

"This is a form of giving back to the community we once lived in."

Dr Ram added their trip would not have been possible through the kind support from corporate bodies, individuals and the support of their families back in New Zealand.

Friends of Fiji Health is a New Zealand-registered charity organisation that was established in July 2010.
